Course description:

In this course we will take a look both at inflectional morphology (e.g. plural -s, past tense -ed, etc.) and word-formation processes such as affixation (e.g. un- in to unfriend), conversion (e.g. Sarah Palin would really Hitler up the place), blending (e.g. $cute + beautiful \rightarrow cuteful$), abbreviations (e.g. to OD \rightarrow death by over dose), compounding (e.g. vanilla ice cream), etc.

Beyond these descriptive basics, we will explore some open questions in morphology: How do young children acquire morphology? How are morphologically complex words such as *government* stored in the brain? As whole words or analyzed into their morphemes, in this case, {govern} and {-ment}? What are crucial differences between English and German morphology?

Thanks to freely accessible, net-based corpora (i.e. large collections of texts) such as CELEX and COCA, it is comparatively easy to devise small-scale quantitative studies and write a term paper in morphology.

Requirements:

Regular attendance, active participation, written summaries of and comments on reading assignments, term paper
