Description:

The value of hard work and productivity lies at the core of the American Dream. However, the notion of work also fosters ambivalence, since most Americans work in order to earn a living and see their labor as a means to something else. Richard Ford writes that, "fiction [...] has plenty to tell us about work and its stamp on us" and in this seminar, we will take a closer look. We will examine the theme of work as it is reflected in literature from the 19th century to today and we will ask questions such as: How do fiction writers depict work through plot, setting, characters and style? What distinguishes contemporary representations of work and workplace dynamics from earlier forms? How do they define the boundary between the necessity of work and the right to leisure? And how does literature capture the drudgery of work without losing its appeal?

This *Blockseminar* is taught in six sessions of four *Semesterwochenstunden* each. The sessions will take place on April 8th, April 22nd, May 6th, May 27th, June 3rd and June 17th from 10 am – 1 pm.
