US-American culture of the 1950s is characterized by contradictory tendencies: compliance, conformity *and* rebellion. Thus, on the one hand there is a politically conservative climate, the Cold War and the aftermath of the ultimate horrors of the Second World War. The expression "the tranquilized fifties," coined by the poet Robert Lowell, alludes to this atmosphere of disillusionment and to the retreat into suburban environments, middle-class values and excessive materialism. On the other hand, this sobered atmosphere is challenged by various counter cultures such as the Beat Movement, by a lively art and music scene and the Civil Rights Movement.

In this seminar, we will take a closer look at these tendencies and will discuss artworks from different media: literature, music, visual arts, photography, TV, film, poetry and drama.

→ Active participation in the form of oral reports and presentations is a <u>vital</u> part of this seminar. In many cases, we will discuss the artworks that <u>you</u> choose. Thus, no silent merging into the margins is possible in this class. Please take this into consideration when enrolling for this course as you will be called to action.
