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53-512 Introduction to Psycholinguistics

Course Description:

This course gives an introduction to psycholinguistics, the the study of how humans acquire, comprehend and produce language. It is an interdisciplinary field shaped by research in linguistics, psychology, philosophy, cogntive science, artificial intelligence, and neuroscience.

The contents of the course will primarily be concerned with questions such as: what are the cognitive processes involved in language use? How do humans acquire, comprehend and produce language? What social rules are associated with language use? What are the connections between language and emotions and thoughts? What brain mechanisms are active in language use? How do humans acquire foreign languages?

Furthermore, the course introduces the knowledge and understanding of the development of psycholinguistics, theoretical and methodological bases of this science, and its relevance. The paticipants will apply some methods and principles of psycholinguistics in psycholinguistic research and experiments.

Finally, the course offers some practical implications of the research in the field of psycholinguistics. This seminar takes into consideration the academic and professional needs of students. Participants of the seminar can explore various case studies and data depending to their interests, background, experiences and programme of study.
