The Romantic period is usually defined as roughly from 1780 to 1830. This period of enormous political and social upheaval witnessed the American and French Revolutions, the Revolutionary and Napoleonic Wars, the prosecution and criticism of the transatlantic slave trade, the Industrial Revolution, and the transformation of Britain into a global superpower. It also saw the rise of the first mass audience for poetry, when, for the first time, poets addressed not only a courtly audience, an audience of subscribers, or an elite metropolitan audience, but a great, anonymous, socially diverse and geographically distributed readership.

In this course, we will meet an array of Romantic

poets and examine how they responded to the challenges and opportunities offered by this changing social, political and commercial environment, and how Romantic poetry as an art form engaged the changes of its time. We will meet poets fascinated by a renewed relationship to nature, but also displaying a very up-todate interest in science. We will see how they experimented with aesthetics and explored a new sensibility. We will trace how they imagined the role of the poet in society, discussed social injustice and poverty, and debated the rights of man.

We will also learn how to determine various poetic forms, such as lyrical verse and song, ballads, sonnets, and comic verse. We will consider poetic tradition and the question of authenticity, the interplay of medievalism and the gothic, and how gender, ethnicity and class intersect in Romantic poetry's negotiation of the self. And we will read a lot of poetry.


