# Introduction to American Literature and Culture (AA3, LAA3, LAA16, IAA12, IAA14)

#### Course description:

This seminar is an introduction to the art of analysing works of literature. Differently put, it serves as an introduction to the methodological and theoretical fundamentals of literary analysis. In the course of the semester, students will be acquainted with the basic tools of the critical trade, i.e. the core concepts, terms, and practices essential to the study of literature and culture. In conjunction with the accompanying lecture, the course addresses different epochs of American literary and cultural history. Genres covered range from poetry to prose, and from drama to film. The ultimate objective is to provide students with the basic skills of textual analysis - skills that should prove beneficial to them in their future studies - and to empower them to engage with texts and media from a critically informed, scholarly- professional perspective.

Last but not least, the course also aims to debunk the myth that literary criticism is an inherently joyless activity. On the contrary, literary analysis can be fascinating and fun!

In the two <u>mandatory</u> tutorials, taught by advanced students, Evgeniya Lebedeva and Lilli von Stengel, students will further practice how to read with due attention to formal aspects of literary works. Please note that participation in one of the two tutorials is absolutely required! The entire

module thus consists of three parts: the seminar, the tutorial, and the lecture course, all of which are obligatory.

### Course requirements

- regular participation
- writing exercises (Studienleistung)
- midterm paper and final exam (*Prüfungsleistung*)

#### Studienleistung

- you will be given specific writing tasks and exercises for each session
- the task descriptions will be uploaded to AGORA in due time
- you will be asked to form an "expert group" with two of your fellow classmates twice throughout the semester; you will then together produce a short analysis (roughly 350 words) on one of the literary texts assigned for a particular session that will need to be uploaded to the AGORA "discussion" section by Friday morning (9 am)
- everyone else (!) will be asked to comment on the texts provided by the expert groups there will be two expert groups for each week in the "discussion" section on AGORA over the next five days (i.e. until the following Wednesday morning); you will be asked to produce either one long response (roughly 150 words) or three shorter comments in the discussion thread; please make sure that you thoroughly and critically engage with the arguments proposed by the expert group(s); ideally, you will perpetuate the discussion with your own comments and ideas.
- if you fail to participate in the discussion thread, this will count as a missed session; you may not miss more than two sessions over the entire semester
- writing exercises are not supposed to be summaries of the reading material
- plagiarism results in an automatic fail

# Midterm paper

- the papers have to follow MLA citation style and must include a bibliography (a style sheet will be handed out later in the course)
- format: 1,5 spacing, Times New Roman 12
- ca. 8000 characters (without spaces) or 1500 words
- the papers can be based on one or more of your writing exercises
