Course description:

The course is based on the textbook *Cognitive English Grammar (CEG)* by Günter Radden & René Dirven and a script on *Meaningful Grammar* by Günter Radden Catherine Schwerin. We will concentrate on notoriously difficult areas of English grammar, in particular count and mass nouns, determiners, quantifiers, modifiers, aspect, tense, and modality. The linguistic approach adopted is that of Cognitive Grammar, according to which language is the product of our cognition. The challenge of the course will be to discover the motivated nature of grammatical phenomena. The insights gained from this approach can also be immediately relevant for a didactic grammar of English.

Participants are expected to do a considerable amount of reading and solving exercises for each session. If your time schedule does not allow you to attend each session throughout the whole term, better decide not to enrol for the course.
