### **The Syntax of Small Objects**

#### *Preliminary description*

The aim of the workshop *The Syntax of Small Objects* is to provide a platform for discussion of empirical and theoretical questions about the nature of roots and formal features as grammatical primitives. The identity of roots and formal features has been a recurring topic in generative circles over the past decades, particularly within generative frameworks of a non-lexicalist/neoconstructivist ilk. The recognition of roots and formal features as the atoms of grammar recovers a long-standing division between conceptual/open-class and functional/closed-class categories, which are — across varied generative frameworks of morphology and syntax — approached differently by syntactic and post-syntactic operations (e.g., as triggers for *Merge* and *Agree*, labeling, post-syntactic competition, etc.). With the goal of contributing with the development of a minimalist theory about roots and formal features, we encourage discussion of any phenomenon that sheds light on (i) the defining characteristics of roots as opposed to formal features, (ii) the syntactic properties roots and formal features can or cannot exhibit, (iii) the kinds of semantic content they can encode, (iv) the interpretive properties that allow them to serve as instructions to the phonological and semantic interfaces, and (v) the way(s) in which locality domains affect their interpretation.
